Repetition

- 1) Personification - Personification is an important poetic device that is used to create drama and effect in a poem.
- 2) Personification - Another poetic device is personification in which an inanimate object is compared to a person & thus shown having human characteristics. In the



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poem we have read, the daffodil have been compared with human beings that are capable of fluttering and dancing.

- 3) Simile & Metaphor - In poetry, we frequently compare one thing with the other. When we compare one thing/person with another with the help of as or like, we have a simile.

• I wandered lonely as a cloud.

On the other hand, when we make a direct comparison between two things/persons without making use of like and as, we have a metaphor.

• I am a cloud floating in the sky.

- 4) Homographs - I learned my subject matter well before the exams.

• My father is a learned man and is held in high respect by all in our locality.

When we look at the above two sentences, we find that the word learned is common in both but its usage is different, i.e., it conveys different meanings.

In the first sentence, learned: past tense of learn.

While in the second sentence, learned: knowledgeable well-read.



So such words are spelled the same but differ in meaning, origin or pronoun pronunciation are called Homographs.
